# **UNESCO Certification for AIS!**

AIS is now an UNESCO school! The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization or UNESCO is widely recognized as one of the most important international organizations promoting peace and equity through education. On Tuesday November 26, Ms. Marcia Solano, Early Childhood Teacher, and Ms. Rocio González, Elementary Principal, attended the certification ceremony.

Ms. Marcia and Ms. Sofía Ibarra, also an Early Childhood teacher, have been the driving forces behind this project, and have worked tirelessly to see it through to completion. When asked what motivated her efforts, Ms. Marcia said, "I believe that sustainable education is one of the most important things I can teach my students".

The process of becoming an UNESCO certified school is quite rigorous. Schools must pass through a 2 year candidacy period. During this period, schools work to show that their focus is in line with UNESCO's pedagogical philosophy. An UNESCO school shines for its creative teaching, focus on the development of critical thinking skills, and a strong emphasis on self-confidence and mutual respect.

Being an UNESCO certified school means that the key ideas of sustainability, cultural diversity/appreciation, and non-violent global citizenship make it into AIS classrooms as part of our teaching prac-

tice. As an UNESCO school, AIS reaffirms its commitment to preparing students to thrive as compassionate, global citizens and its role as a leader in transformative, values-driven education in Costa Rica.




# **AIS Participates in Math Olympics**

The Math Olympics is not just a contest about math and numbers, it's a big competition between students all around the world pushing their thinking limits. The competitions usually have students take a test for hours with no calculators allowed. These events aim to improve the mathematical skills of participants through team competitions.

The American International School of Costa Rica has been participating in Math Olympics competitions for about one year. There are multiple competitions that the school has participated in with the most recent competition being Olcoma on August 30th. The next competitions will be AASCA, Nicaragua in March, Kangaroo, online during campus in June, and Olcoma, Heredia in September. The Math Department coordinates with these different organizations which hold the events in different places. The objective is to improve the ability and skill of talented students at AIS.

These types of activities require a lot of preparation from students since they are competing with at least 150 other students. "Study a lot before the test," said Paulo Lossley who has participated in the Math Olympics. Jorge Bravo, one of the teachers at AIS, prepares these students with tutoring lessons two times a week. This preparation process begins at least 3 months before the competition in order to cover all the material needed.

STEM education at Disneyworld? Yes it's true!

This year a group of 11 students from AIS traveled to Disney from October 27 to November 4th . These students were participating in a STEAM camp called CODED. The students were chaperoned by two staff members, Miss Dylana Vincente, our Cocurricular Coordinator, and Ms. Vero Alvarez, Marketing & Communications Officer. Every day students participated in workshops and STEM activities culminating in a final project.

The stem activities took place in the hotel or in Disney parks like Hollywood or Universal. As mentioned, Coded 's final project was to create a website and slides for an amusement park you would create with people from your school. Students from AIS were divided into two groups for the competition.

The teams began by deciding their park's

main theme. After the theme was chosen you would have to think about rides, merchandise and other important infrastructure details like bathrooms, trash cans, and food courts.

We had to create an Icon for our park. Every park has an Icon, or symbol that can easily be associated with the park. For example, the icon for the Magic Kingdom is the Disney castle. Next, we created a mascot. During the workshops we were given assistance and we thought of all the details including the physics of the rides.

We also had to create a main ride. This main ride had a story it followed that linked with the icon previously created. Our theme was Jungle, so the ride followed our mascot MonkeyTony's backstory. This ride was recognized as the best attraction, an achievement which won my team best ride award.

The hour of Code is a fun activity that has recently been implemented into the school's calendar. 2024 is the third year that AIS will participate.

Grades 1 - 6 participate in this activity which takes place in the gym. Though there is a large number of students in just one place, Ms. Eve Kolitsky, Information & Technology teacher, states that it is quite easy to manage all of them. They are free to dress down in pajamas and comfy clothes and bring pillows and blankets. Students spread out across the floor in the gym with their iPads and spend an hour having fun with code.

The purpose of this activity is to encourage students to engage with coding. This is important because coding is actually quite a valuable skill. Ms. Eve says, "Learning basic programming is considered a modern literacy. It's something that everyone should understand on some level."

Each grade has access to different activities according to their age and skill set. This is important because it sets students up for success. A good activity challenges, but is ultimately achievable.

The event starts with a welcome message followed by time for the different coding activities. The activity finishes as students get a chance to see what they will be able to do in a few short years. Students look at code projects created by 8th grade students and help select which projects will be submitted to a competition at Carnegie Mellon University.

The organization which founded this activity is called Code.org. Created in 2013, Code.org is one of the biggest educational coding platforms. Millions of people in over 180 countries participate in the Hour of Code activity. The organization prides itself as being very inclusive; 45% of Code.org students are young women and 50% come from marginalized racial or ethnic groups.



The agenda mainly talks about the Financials, Human resources, Enrollment (admissions), and Marketing of the

school. The school board has existed since the school has been around.





### 3 Star Recognition!

This year AIS is proud to announce that we have been recognized with 3 stars from the program Bandera Azul Ecológica. Bandera Azul, or "Blue Flag", is an initiative of the Costa Rican government designed to encourage sustainable development across society. AIS has been recognized in the category of Educational Institution.

Bandera Azul evaluates progress over the course of a year using multiple metrics including Use of Water, Use of Electricity, Management of Solid Waste, Mental Health, and Social Welfare. The initiative is incredibly broad in its reach. Projects include everything from creating a plan to increase community participation in voluntary recycling to physically weighing the solid waste to demonstrate that plan's effectiveness.

Ms. Gaby Murillo, head of the Science Department, has taken a leading role over



the past three years to organize committees and supervise the documentation of our progress toward meeting these goals. Ms. Gaby says that the most chal-

lenging and most important part of the process is documentation. For example, when construction was underway to remodel the High School Plazas, water use increased. Documentation provided a justification for this increase and allowed the school to maintain its 3 Star rating.

Institutions are reviewed on a yearly basis and each year evaluations start from 0. This methodology is important to retain the significance of the award. An institution which does not create a cultural change to embrace sustainability may lose stars if programs are not continued. The ability to maintain a 3 Star rating is an impressive indicator of AIS's commitment. Sustainability is a core value here, and it's a choice that each and every member of the AIS community makes every day. Congratulations to all for this recognition!
